Mark your calendars for **Saturday, June 7th, 2008** and plan to join your friends and neighbors at the Fifth Annual Truckee Day Street clean up! More than 800 volunteers teamed up during last year's event to collect and remove an impressive 6 tons of roadside litter from our community. Soon it will be time to hit the streets again!

**It's easy to participate!** Grab your work gloves and meet us at the appropriate check in station for your neighborhood or subdivision at 8:00 a.m. Bags, street assignments and clean up instructions will be available there. You'll also receive a 5th Anniversary Truckee Day t-shirt for your participation when you check in — *while supplies last*.

After the clean up, a Town-wide "Block Party" will be held with music by The Rusty Strings, a Green Living Expo featuring local non profits and businesses specializing in sustainability, and plenty of kid's activities. **All clean-up volunteers will receive a free barbecue lunch for their efforts!** Volunteers will also receive free blue recycling bags when they stop by the Keep Truckee Green booth at the Block Party.

### **Recycle is the action of the month.**

This issue of the Shire will provide information on various recycling programs that are available through the eastern regional landfill (we used to call it the dump) the Town of Truckee, and various other drop points throughout the town. See <http://www.townoftruckee.com/recycle.html> for more information on programs and drop points in the Town of Truckee.

Some of new disposal laws have come as a surprise to me and some were not. In 2006 the State of California passed a law banning the disposal of batteries in household waste. That came as a surprise to me and left me asking the question, "Then what am I supposed to do with them?" As time passed different battery drop off points were designated and starting this month the Glenshire Club house has become a household battery drop off point as well. Come by Monday through Friday between 7:30 and 4:00 to properly dispose of those toxic old household batteries.

### **Got Pine needles?**

I guess you can call it green waste, light brown waste or pine needle recycling. Glenshire Club House has two fire safe days scheduled for June 21<sup>st</sup> and September 27<sup>th</sup> from 8 to 2:30. If you can't make those days we will also accept pine needles Monday through Friday, by appointment only, so call us early at 587-6202. Natural woody debris only: tree limbs, brush, yard trimmings, pine needles, dead leaves, dry grass. Debris should be no more than 4 feet in length and less than 4 inches in diameter.

### **Summer jobs available**

With spring just around the corner we are shifting gears and have already fired up the filters on the pool. School age kids and young adults are thinking about the last day of school and the summer ahead. Of course, some are thinking of working and saving or spending the money that they earn. Job! Working with friends! What better way to spend the summer and earn some money than to be working at the Glenshire pool.

With the new federal transportation rate reimbursement at over 50 cents a mile, a drive to west end beach and back would cost over \$10. If you worked at the Glenshire pool you could walk or ride a bike to work and save that \$10 for something you enjoy. We have positions open for the Pass office, Trading Post, Life Guards, and Swim instructors. Wages range from \$8/h at the trading post to over \$13.50/h for senior guard/swim instructors.

Not a certified lifeguard or instructor? TDRPD has classes available. Call 587-7720 for current class schedule. The City of Reno also has ongoing classes available. Contact Steve at 1-775-334-2262 for current classes. Glenshire will reimburse employees who obtain lifeguard or WSI certificates for up to \$200 if they complete the whole summer season working at Glenshire.

### **Glenshire Trail Committee (GTC)**

In an effort to lessen the impacts of development and improve the quality of life in Glenshire, the GDRA board of Directors approved the formation of the Glenshire Trail Committee (GTC) in spring of 2007. The mission of the GTC is to work in conjunction with the Glenshire homeowners, community organizations and the Board of Glenshire to help create alternative transportation (non motorized) connections through the neighborhood. The GDRA is currently working on phase 1 of the Glenshire Community Link Trail connection from the future terminus of the Truckee River Legacy Trail to the Glenshire Lake Trail. The Trail will travel along an already designated recreational easement paralleling Glenshire Drive between the parcels of Glenshire Dr. and Berkshire Circle. It is preliminarily scheduled to be 4 feet wide consisting of decomposed packed granite on top of a base rock material. This is still in the

community comment and funding period. For more information on this and future trails you can join the GTC committee or attend the GDRA Board meetings.

## **Managing your Trash and Recyclables – Refresher 101.**

### **What are my options for recycling in Truckee?**

You have two options to participate in Truckee's household recycling program.

#### **1. Drop your recyclables off at one of two local collection facilities:**

The first option is to drop-off your recycling at NexCycle, a CRV only buy back facility located behind Safeway on Donner Pass Road, great if you have lots of glass bottles or aluminum cans. NexCycle is open Tuesday through Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. All your recyclables, including non-CRV can be dropped off at the Eastern Regional Landfill located on Cabin Creek Road off HWY 89 south. The drop-off facility is open Tuesday-Saturday from 8:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. and closed from 12:00 p.m. -12:30 p.m. for lunch.

**Or**

#### **2. Use the Blue Bag Curbside Recycling program.**

The second option is to use blue bags and participate in Truckee's curbside recycling program. First purchase blue bags. It's important to purchase strong durable blue bags so that they hold up in our local trash collection process. Look for blue bags that are at least 1.5 millimeters thick. Make sure when you are using blue bags that you do not over stuff the bags and that you tie the bags securely. Since blue bags are collected with the trash, it is important that the bags hold up until they reach the Eastern Regional Landfill where the recyclables are recovered.

Durable blue bags of different sizes are sold at Mountain Hardware located at 11320 Donner Pass Road across from Safeway. Residents can also purchase blue bags in bulk from Tahoe Supply Company located 10939 A Industrial Way, Suite 100.

#### **What goes into blue bags?**

Please recycle all of the following:

- Glass bottles and jars

- Aluminum cans

- Plastics #1-7 and mixed rigid plastics (examples include laundry baskets and snow disk).

- Mixed paper – junk mail, magazines, phone books, catalogs and generally all other types of paper.

- Cardboard – broken down and placed in blue bags. Loose cardboard left by your garbage can is collected as trash. Large amounts of cardboard can be dropped off for free using the public cardboard only drop-off locations at Fire

Station 92 at 11473 Donner Pass Road and Glenshire Elementary School at 10990 Dorchester Drive. Cardboard can also be dropped off at the Eastern Regional Landfill for free recycling.

Tin cans, steel and bi-metal cans

### **What's not recyclable at this time?**

Styrofoam

Foil type packages (chip bags)

Waxy milk cartons, waxy coffee cups etc.

Film plastics (Saran Wrap, cereal box liners, etc)

Plastic grocery bags can be dropped off at Safeway or Albertson's in Truckee.

### **How to prepare materials:**

Please rinse your recyclables.

Tie the top of your blue bags securely. Blue bags are collected with your trash so to ensure that recyclables stay separate from trash securely tie the top and use durable blue bags.

### **What do you do with your blue bag when full and tightly tied?**

Blue bags are treated the exact same way as your trash until they reach the Eastern Regional Landfill Transfer Station. Once at the Transfer Station blue bags are set aside and trash is processed and sorted for recyclables. When sorting recyclables from trash the recovery rate of the recyclables is about 17-18%. At the end of the day blue bags are processed and mixed recyclables are sorted by material type. More than 95% of recyclables contained in blue bags are recovered for recycling. The use of blue bags increases the recovery of recyclables.

Place your blue bags next to your trash container or in your bear box on your trash collection day for pick up by Tahoe Truckee Sierra Disposal.

**Remember: BE BEAR AWARE!** Please keep in mind that our resident bears are EXTREMELY active this time of year. With hot and dry conditions, many bears are heading down mountains in search of water and easy food sources. Please remember we live in "bear country" and as the seasons begin to change more and more bears will be hungry for anything they can get. It's up to all of us working together to protect the bears and keep them out of our trash cans and dumpsters.

For residents: Please do not leave your trash and recyclables on the curb outside of a bear box over night. If you do not have a bear box, place your trash and recyclables on the curb the day of your service only. If you do have a bear box its equally important to REMOVE THE BEAR BOX KEY. Our bears have been around along time and have figured out how to partially open a bear box that has a key left in the lock and pull out anything inside. Removing your keys ensures that the bears stay protected.

For businesses and dumpster users: After depositing trash and recycling into the dumpster please secure lids properly. Please inform employees of the importance for proper trash management.

Visitors: Welcome to Bear Country! While visiting the area please utilize provided trash and recycling bins (blue bags for all mixed recycling). If for some reason, bins are not available in the location you are at, please pack out what you have packed in. Illegal dumping and or leaving trash behind has become a serious issue that affects our entire community.

If you are camping at area campgrounds, please utilize bear sheds to lock up all of your

food and fragrant toiletries. Utilize the dumpsters at the campgrounds for your trash and recycling daily. Do not leave your trash bags tied to trees over night. Make sure when utilizing the dumpsters to close and secure the lid.

The Eastern regional Landfill is located three miles outside of Truckee on Cabin Creek Road off HWY 89 south towards Squaw Valley. They are open Monday-Saturday from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. (the buy back recycling facility is closed on Mondays). For questions regarding the facility please contact Tahoe Truckee Sierra Disposal at (530) 583-0148.

For more information on protecting bears and other wildlife please visit the Bear League at [www.savebears.org](http://www.savebears.org) . Don't forget to keep an eye out for bears in the roadway. The Tahoe – Truckee area has had a record year for bear deaths due to vehicle collisions. Please drive carefully.

**Recycle your old refrigerator and get paid \$30 in cold cash.**

Sierra Pacific customers are eligible to get paid \$30 for recycling their old refrigerator or freezer. You contact SP, they pick it up for free and you get \$\$\$\$. Go to [www.sierrapacific.com](http://www.sierrapacific.com) go to the conservation page / home / rebates for more information.

**Electronic and Universal waste collection and community paper shred event**

Electronics, household batteries, fluorescent lamps and bulbs, empty aerosol cans and any item that contains mercury is considered Universal waste and should not be placed in your trash.

A FREE one day drop off event for Truckee residents: bring all your electronics and Universal waste to the back parking lot of Truckee Town Hall on June 21<sup>st</sup> from 9 to 2 for free recycling.

In addition, the Truckee Police Dept. and Shred—it will be onsite accepting confidential documents from residents for free shredding. This service is offered from 9 to 11 only.

### **Free Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Drop-Off days.**

Tahoe Truckee Sierra Disposal offers Truckee Residents free HHW drop-off. Call 583-0148 to schedule your free appointment for one of the following events: May 17<sup>th</sup>, June 14<sup>th</sup>, July 12<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup>, August 16<sup>th</sup> & 30<sup>th</sup>, September 13<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> October 11<sup>th</sup>.

There is no charge to renew passes with a 2008 sticker. New pool passes cost \$6. The pool pass office will be open weekends beginning May 24, and daily starting June 16.

### **Level III - Stroke Readiness**

Class Limit: 6

### **Level IV - Stroke Development**

Deep water bobbing, float positions, rotary breathing, standing front dive, front crawl, back crawl, elementary backstroke, sculling on back, breaststroke, sidestroke, introduction to wall turns.

Time: 9:00 - 9:25 am  
Class Limit: 8

### **Level V - Stroke Refinement**

Learn personal safety and rescue. Alternate breathing, beginner diving progression from board, long shallow dive, breaststroke, sidestroke, underwater swimming, elementary backstroke, introduction to butterfly-dolphin kick, front crawl, back crawl, front and back open turns, personal safety and rescue.

## **2008 FACILITY PASS POLICY**

### **Photo Pass Information:**

Members 5 years and older must obtain a photo pass and must be presented to the facility staff each visit. Only members in good standing may enjoy the facilities; dues, special assessments, and any other fees must be paid.

Photo passes are \$6 each. Existing photo passes are renewable each year at no charge. Adults and children may be required to provide acceptable identification (ie, drivers license/school ID card) to receive passes.

Lost or stolen cards should be reported immediately. Replacement photo passes will be reissued at the Owner's expense.

Unauthorized use of an Association photo pass may result in the loss of facility use and privileges.

Members arriving at facility without passes (may, can, will) be charged guest fees or denied access to the facility.

**Immediate Family:** Passes are available to owners and their immediate family or related persons who live in the common household year round, whether or not they use the facility.

**Extended Family:** If an Owner has less than five immediate family members, photo passes may be issued to designated extended related family or long term guests (more than 3 months). Total passes cannot exceed 5 and any other extra family members will be considered guests (guest fees apply). Previously issued passes must be returned before new passes can be issued to a new individual.

**Guest Information:**

A guest is any individual invited by an Owner to use amenities (with the approval of the Association), including renters. Members may invite up to four guests per day. Guests must have a guest pass or be accompanied by the Owner.

Guest fees are \$3 per visit per guest of any age.

Members may purchase a discounted guest card for their guests. 10 visit guest passes are \$25. Pass sales are limited and recorded.

Guest passes are for the sole purpose of making access to the facility easier for visiting household guests. This does not include the right to purchase guest passes for resale or to provide non-Glenshire residents, including but not limited to; Cambridge, Meadows, Juniper Hills, and Martis Peak visitors access to our amenities on a regular basis. Abuse of this will result in loss of amenity rights of the owner.

**Multiple Owners:**

Multiple owners of a single property may be issued a maximum of 5 photo passes under the extended family definition. Proof of joint ownership (copy of the deed) will be required. Additional family members will be considered guests (see guest information).

**Owners of Unimproved Properties:**

Owners of unimproved properties may receive photo passes for their immediate family as described under immediate family section or may transfer up to 5 photo passes under the extended family definition.

**Transfer of facility passes:**

Homeowners may transfer facility rights to leasehold tenants provided the lease term is three (3) months or longer. Either a facility transfer form (obtained at the pass office), or written notice from the homeowner and verification of the lease will be required.

**GENERAL RULES APPLICABLE TO FACILITY USE**

**Use of Facility by Minors, Members and Guest**

Glenshire pool is not a childcare facility. Children under the age of **ten** will not be allowed to use, or have access to, any Association amenities without **direct family adult supervision. Any member or guest not following the rules may be asked to leave.**

### **Personal Injury and Property Damage**

Amenity users assume all risk of personal injury to themselves, their family members, and guests, and for loss of, or damage to, the personal property of any such person; and hereby agree that the Association, and its management, staff, or any agent, shall not be responsible for any loss or injury sustained by the Owner, dependent child, immediate or extended family or guest of the Owner. The Association Rules may require the execution of further waivers of liability as a condition to Amenity use.

**The Association reserves the right to modify the policy on a case-by-case basis.**
